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Chairman's Report

Change is something we so often want to avoid as it can unsettle us and bring to us new things we are not used to. "Oh, for the quiet life", we may say. And yet change can be a good thing. Indeed, the very change God brings to us in our salvation is a marvellous joy. As Jesus reminds us in Matthew 18, unless we change and become like little children we shall never enter the kingdom of heaven. As Christians, we also look forward to a marvellous change ahead. At the last day when the trumpet sounds, we will be changed, and for the better (see 1 Corinthians 15). His generosity and optimism have enabled growth and development of new schools where

others might have backed away. His focus on the task of CEO has given godly and stable leadership. Laurie, thank you. We also welcome Mr Ross Smith as the new CEO and thank God for the provision of Ross to us.

The Corporation Board took this opportunity of change in CEO to enlist the help of the Australian Institute of Company Directors to take us through a Governance Review of the Corporation. We are just now processing the outcomes of this review. Please pray for the Board and the Corporation as we put into place necessary changes to our governance for the future.

Some changes are also much easier to implement than others. During 2016 we had the privilege of opening a new school at Marsden Park, which currently operates as a campus of Richard Johnson Anglican School. However, parallel to this, we made the difficult decision to close Shoalhaven Anglican School at Milton, due to ongoing concerns with its financial viability. The staff and community of Shoalhaven School worked long and hard for the school. Thank you for all your efforts.

I would like to thank all people involved across the Corporation for their ongoing prayer, work and support of the ministry of our schools. Without the tireless work of so many fellowworkers we would not be able to deliver the Christian education that we are so blessed with. I would particularly

like to thank Mr David Minty, who retired from the Board after 14 years as a Director and 10 years as Deputy Chair. I have particularly benefited from working with David as my Deputy Chair and am thankful for his support and wisdom over these past seven years.

Special thanks also go to Mr Stephen Poucher, who resigned as Chair of Richard Johnson Anglican School Council after 12 years, and Mr Rick Stevens, who resigned as Chair of Loquat Valley Anglican School Council after 24 years. Both men have made enormous contributions to these schools and have been greatly appreciated by all in their respective school communities. Thank you Stephen! Thank you Rick!

At the end of 2016 we also farewelled Mrs Megan Krimmer as Principal of Roseville College. Megan brought a strength of Christian educational leadership to Roseville and has positioned the College well for the years ahead. Thank you Megan.

Members of Synod, thank you for your ongoing support of the Corporation and our schools. We value your prayer and partnership.

Pursuant to the Accounts, Audits and Annual Reports Ordinance 1995

1. BACKGROUND

The Anglican Schools Corporation (the Corporation) was established in 1947 by an ordinance of the Synod of the Diocese of Sydney – (now known as the) *Anglican* Schools Corporation Ordinance 1947. Pursuant to the Anglican Church (Bodies Corporate) Act 1938 the Corporation was later incorporated under the name 'The Council for the Promotion of Sydney Church of England Diocesan Schools' by virtue of the Order published in the NSW Government Gazette No 55 of 1965 on 2 April 1965. The name of the Corporation was changed to Anglican Schools Corporation in 2015.

The entity, Anglican Schools Corporation (ABN 63 544 529 806), is registered with the Australian Charities and Not-for-profits Commission (ACNC), as are each of the two Corporation-controlled entities: ATC Western Sydney Limited (ABN 66 126 481 178), and Capstone Finance Limited (ABN33 094 963 158). These entities provide reports to the ACNC, including annual information statements, as well as the consolidated financial statements of the Corporation group of entities.

2. CHARTER

The Objects of the Corporation are to serve Christ by equipping students for his world through efficiently operating strategically placed Anglican educational establishments that -

- (a) offer high quality education within a Christian worldview shaped by the Bible, and
- (b) communicate in word and deed the gospel of Jesus Christ to students, staff, parents and the wider community, and
- (c) are financially accessible to local communities.

The Corporation's Mission is to provide affordable quality Christian education.

4. MANAGEMENT AND STRUCTURE

4.1 Board

The Members collectively constitute the Board of the Corporation, which is responsible for governing the Corporation; oversight for all financial matters concerning each of the schools and the Corporation; development of financial policy; approval of property purchases and building projects; the material well-being (benefits) of Corporation staff; employment matters; communication with government bodies.

The Members of the Corporation are -

- (a) up to two persons appointed by the Archbishop;
- (b) nine persons elected by the Synod; and
- (c) up to two persons appointed by the Board.

Member particulars are set out on the previous page. The normal terms of appointment are for periods of three years, with eligibility of retiring Members for re-appointment or re-election, provided that such reappointment or re-election would not result in that Member being a Member for more than 14 consecutive years.

The Board meets monthly (usually up to ten times per annum) and at other times when business requires.



At 2016 School Census date (August), these schools were providing education for 14,185 students and employment for some 1,350 staff (full or part-time). In addition the schools engage casual relief staff as particular needs arise. Each school in 2016 continued to extend its Christian support and outreach within the community which each serves. Further particulars of each school are set out in the School section of this report.

- b. Each school, in general, has a Building Fund, Scholarship Fund and Library to aid its individual capital project and resource development. The financial reports for each form part of the Corporation's audited and published Annual Financial Statements. In aggregate these accounts amount to \$5.6 million at balance date.
- c. In addition to those outlined above, the Corporation has continued to look towards the acquisition or development of additional schools. Further particulars are outlined in the Schools section of this report.

Claremont College is a thriving primary school in the Eastern Suburbs, renowned across Sydney, as an Anglican school that seeks to achieve excellence in all aspects of its operation. The school aims to provide a comprehensive and inclusive education within a caring and supportive Christian environment. The employment of quality staff who are committed Christians is given high priority and it is through the Christian teaching and student welfare programs within the school that children gain an understanding of God's love and care for them in all aspects of their lives.

Providing firm foundations for life and learning is a very important aspect of the School. Complementing our high academic results and standards, the school aims to ensure that all children develop the necessary skills and learning dispositions to equip each child for success in the future. Claremont College delivers programs in creative and practical arts, technology, Mandarin, Indonesian, sport, physical education, health and personal development, within the context of a Christian education.

In 2016 Claremont College produced two significant documents. The College Strategic Plan (2016-2020) 'Our Vision, Our Story' was launched in July. Also, a comprehensive research project was completed and published for the benefit of the school and wider educational community. This project entitled 'Co-Teaching Improves Student Outcomes' provided valuable data measuring the many benefits of co-teaching at Claremont College as well as providing a comprehensive case-study investigating school transformation, leadership, school culture and the process of change management. Both of these documents can be found on the home page of the Claremont College website.

2016 saw the ongoing refurbishment of a number of facilities including our Kindergarten and Year 1 learning spaces. Claremont College attracts the interest of educators and architects from across Australia and overseas, keen to learn about our innovative approaches to teaching and learning which are grounded in contemporary research and evidence based practice. Our refurbishment project has certainly equipped Claremont College to move confidently into the future, positioning us as one of Sydney's leading innovative and progressive Primary schools with the academic results to match. The Principal Mr Doug Thomas, as well as many other staff members speak regularly at educational conferences about innovation at Claremont College, particularly about the classroom designs and the Claremont College model of co-teaching.

At Claremont College, all children from Kindergarten to Year 6 join together for weekly chapel to hear Bible based talks presented by the Principal and the wider staff team. This service includes singing and prayer and is a highlight for both staff and students in the life of the school. In addition to the Christian Education Program, the Gospel is promoted throughout the week at the lunchtime Cru Group, JAM (Jesus and Me) a Bible study for senior students, and also a weekly breakfast and Bible study for the Year 6 children.

The children and parents generously supported a number of charities during 2016 including the Fiji Cyclone Appeal, The Sydney Children's Hospital and the sponsorship of a number of children through Compassion, World Vision and the Smith Family. In 2016 the Claremont College Parents and Friends Association continued its incredible support of the school and generously contributed over \$50,000 towards a wide range of projects and initiatives. Parent support and outreach programs are also an integral part of the ministry of the school. 2016 was a year of incredible blessing in many ways and we are thankful to God for countless opportunities to proclaim the gospel of Jesus Christ to the school community.

Danebank was again listed as the highest scoring non-selective school in the St. George and Sutherland Shire regions.

At Danebank an understanding of Biblical teaching and an outworking of those teachings underpins all that we do. Danebank girls engage with the person and teachings of Jesus Christ through weekly chapel services, Christian education lessons, Christian lunchtime groups, prayer and Bible study groups and camps. These elements of life at Danebank are supported by the witness of staff and students and integration of a Christian worldview in the classroom.

At Danebank, girls are encouraged to develop their natural gifts and to seek to discover new ones. They are encouraged to strive for their best and to develop confidence in their own abilities. They are encouraged to fulfil their potential in every way, to serve the wider community and to model integrity.

In 2016, Danebank girls shone in a range of areas. In particular, we were delighted for our Year 12 students whose HSC results were outstanding:.

- · Three students gained All Rounder Awards for achieving Band 6 in 10 Units.
- · Almost 100% students qualified for Degree Courses
- 48 students were listed as Distinguished Achievers in a range of subjects
- · More than 30% of the cohort achieved ATARs above 90.

Danebank was again listed as the highest scoring non-selective school in the St. George and Sutherland Shire regions.

These results were evidence of the girls' talents and hard work but also evidence of the professionalism of staff. An extensive professional development program assists teachers to manage change and to focus on applying the most effective teaching practices. Teaching staff are personally committed to

the school's vision. They provide exceptional care for the girls, as Christian role models and by giving girls encouragement and personal support.

Danebank is a vibrant learning community. The enthusiastic participation of students in all aspects of school life is a most pleasing testimony to their strong school spirit and positive engagement. 2016 was notable for the development of additional extra curricular opportunities which have been enthusiastically supported by the girls. Students excelled in public speaking, sports, visual arts competitions, and debating.

At Danebank, students are asked to uphold the Danebank motto, Ut Prosim (That I May Serve). They serve others through many fund-raising activities that support worthwhile causes, such as the school's continued support for the Katoke Lweru School in Tanzania. Other community service projects enable the girls to grow, to become confident and globally connected as they seek to contribute to the welfare of others.

Mamre Anglican School is renowned in outer Western Sydney for providing a caring and quality education in a Christian setting. Our staff empower students to embrace the Christian faith by providing outstanding role modelling of their own faith. When students graduate or leave Mamre we are confident they will have gained a knowledge and understanding of who Jesus is. This is a major shift for families establishing and achieving educational goals. This will have significant long-term benefits for our local community as they realise and appreciate the high value of upper secondary education. Momentum is building and we are excited to be moving into the next phase of pursuing a wide variety of subjects for our Year 11 and 12 students including VET courses such as Construction and Football Studies.

Mamre is renowned in Western Sydney for its unique, elite Football Program. Students travel long distances to attend our school and participate in clinic style football training sessions with quality coaches. We have many students who play and compete in elite competitions in the Sydney basin. Our school prides itself on delivering high quality Christian education to these students as well as providing a wonderful football program that develops their unique talent.

Our mission at Mamre continues to be one of 'Serving Christ' in all we do. We are proud of our achievements throughout 2016, particularly our excellent NAPLAN results for years 3, 5 and 7, which for the first time are well above state averages in most areas. Our morning routine, synthetic phonics program in K-2 and direct instruction approach to teaching literacy and numeracy is producing students who are enjoying reading and loving mathematics. Penrith Anglican College's modern campus is set on 18 hectares at the foot of the Blue Mountains overlooking the rapidly growing Penrith Valley. The College provides high quality. Christian education to students from Pre-K to Year 12. preparing them for a bright future and lives with purpose.

In 2016 the College took an important step toward the future. In order to continue to refocus on its mission statement, "To educate students to become informed and responsible global citizens who follow Christ and serve others", the College undertook a successful rebranding process. The new College crest and key messages will allow the College to stand apart from other schools in the community and ensure that our reputation of encouraging students to learn, achieve and progress is understood and celebrated.

2016 continued to showcase the breadth of our students' gifts both academically and across all areas of the curriculum and co-curricular activities, exemplifying the College's motto 'Personal excellence through Christ'.

The 2016 Year 12 cohort once again achieved outstanding results with 19% of students scoring an ATAR of over 90, including all of our International Baccalaureate (IB) cohort, and 34% of the year receiving an ATAR over 80. A student received a nomination for Art Express for his major Visual Art work and another student was placed third in the NSW for Earth and Environmental Science.

Other students took alternative pathways to obtaining their HSC; one student successfully completed her Certificate III in Sports Career Oriented Participation and was awarded the CIS Outstanding Contribution Award for her service as a team selector and coach. This talented student has gone on to play for the Australian Shooting Stars Squad for up-andcoming talent.

A Year 8 student was recognised for his community service and fundraising activities, as the youngest nominee for the NSW/ACT Young Achievers Award.

In 2016 Penrith Anglican College's Headmaster Mr Mark Lewis, travelled with Year 11 students to Nepal. The oncein-a-lifetime trip saw the group trek the Annapurna Trail and then work with a small community, devastated by the 2015 earthquake, to rebuild their school.

As part of the College's Christian Fellowship Program, 24 students spent nine days in Fiji visiting a number of schools. a church and youth group, encouraging the local people and each other in their faith.

The year marked the introduction of the very successful STEM Lego Robotic co-curricular group. The enthusiasm of the group of Year 7 students has flowed over into the primary school with a large group of Year 5 and 6 students meeting once a week to develop their skills in coding and robotic, preparing them for the iSTEM program in Years 9 and 10.

2016 saw the continuation of the College's major works program with the redevelopment of the Senior Library. The renovation saw the resources of three decentralised libraries brought together into one new centre for Years 5 -12. Incorporating a number of different open spaces and functional furniture, the space has been designed to enable students to work alone or collaboratively in groups. The new Library is an exciting and welcoming central space in the College where all students can have a sense of belonging.

It has been a memorable year at Penrith Anglican College and we are continually thankful to God for the inclusive and nurturing community which is the heartbeat of the College, and the opportunities we are given to serve it.

We would like to thank the Synod, The Anglican Schools Corporation, College Council, staff and the College community for their support and encouragement in our work to serve Christ to bring out personal excellence in all our students.

We ask for continued prayer for wisdom over the coming year as we encourage our staff and students to live according to Colossians 3.23, 'Whatever you do, work at it with all your heart, as working for the Lord, not for human masters... it is the Lord Christ you are serving'.

The School has capably moved beyond the establishment phase, gaining a heightened sense of being a mature learning environment...

At the end of 2016 the School completed 20 years. With celebrations in full swing, the following words formed the core of the Principal's message for the School's yearbook:

When writing an article for the School's 10 yearbook in 2007 I didn't contemplate writing a celebratory message for a 20 yearbook in 2017. As Foundation Principal, I am conscious of all that has transpired during the School's second decade, which has seen many aspirational endeavours being brought to fruition. Whereas the first 10 years could best be described as the pioneering era, 2007 to now could be characterised as a season of tremendous consolidation. The 20 yearbook, 'Leaping Forward', further promotes the analogy of an ongoing journey for people associated with this School, from 'Footprints (annual yearbook) to 'Footsteps' (10 yearbook) to 'Leaping Forward' (20 yearbook), and it provides an opportunity for some in our Richard Johnson community, present and past, to share their reflections, which I hope you enjoy reading.

The School has capably moved beyond the establishment phase, gaining a heightened sense of being a mature learning environment; growing from the 2007 snapshot of 608 students and the first Year 12 cohort of 17 students to the 2016 snapshot of 920 students and the tenth Year 12 cohort of 70 students. Realistic confidence in the School's operation and a vision for expanding the provision of Christian education in greater Western Sydney has led to another establishment phase, for a new Campus, in the developing region of Marsden Park.

The evolution of a key phrase appropriately depicts the School's maturing culture 'a place to belong' has transitioned to 'a place to belong and succeed'.

Academic success has been cultivated by student access to an increased range of curriculum extension, enrichment and differentiation, dependent on students' strengths and needs, and maintained through to the Higher School Certificate when Richard Johnson students have consistently shown outstanding achievement and progress. Enhancements of the School's learning provisions, more extra-curricular opportunities (Musicals, Mission Trips, Performing Arts Tours, Annual Camps for Years 4-11, Winter Sleepouts), the comprehensive integration of technology and the facilitation of

greater student leadership across the School have been some of the past decade's outstanding highlights.

Our School community is representative of over thirty different nationalities. What a blessing! Our young people, by way of their natural daily interactions, enrich such diversity. An observer commented how impressed students mixed with one another - 'that's the future of Australia, right there', he said, 'and it fills me with much hope and pride'.

We are a Christian School. Every family choosing Richard Johnson knows that the School's philosophy, policies and practices are based on the Bible and its values and teaching. This intent has been simplified for everyone by way of our School Song and Prayer: "We want Him (Jesus) to be number one in our School". Richard Johnson staff try to ensure that everyday activities and lessons are approached from a Christian perspective, helping students to better understand God's creation and to appreciate all that He has done to show His amazing love, grace and forgiveness.

This year we began a new tradition: the first Friday each February is named 'Richard Johnson Day' after our School's namesake, Rev. Richard Johnson. Friday 3 February 2017 was, in fact, exactly 229 years since the first Christian Church Service took place on Australian soil under a large gum tree near the present Circular Quay. Only one week after the First Fleet arrived, Rev. Johnson spoke to the assembled convicts, soldiers and officials from Psalm 116:12

"What shall I render unto the Lord for all his benefits to me?"

Johnson would have tried to make them aware that, when difficult circumstances press in, God's goodness remains steadfast. This timeless realisation assures us. as well. of God's faithfulness. when we place our trust in Him. We can be exceedingly grateful for the example set by Rev. Richard Johnson.

My encouragement to the Richard Johnson School community, on the occasion of our '20 Years Celebrations', is to keep alive the memory of our unique heritage, which may, as we remain true to God's Word and to the outstanding example of Richard Johnson, continue to inspire and guide our School from strength to strength.

Despite being a non-selective school, ours ranks consistently among top educational performers in NSW. In 2016, Roseville College has proven itself as a leader in STEM innovation, with individual achievements by students and staff at a state and national level in fields like coding and robotics. and technological innovation.

In 2016, the College began the year under the theme "Dare to..." inspired by the Olympic Games and underpinned by Joshua 1:9, "...Be strong and courageous. Do not be afraid; do not be discouraged, for the LORD your God will be with you wherever you go". From the first day of school, our student Leadership Team and Senior Girls set a typically high benchmark, encouraging girls that "Small Steps, Big Impacts" are possible even for school-aged girls. In her address to the student body, School Captain and 2016 Dux, Zoe King, said, "For most of my life I have assumed that I could not make my mark on the world until I was an adult. But then I looked around me and saw a 17-year-old girl winning a Nobel Prize... and a 10-year-old girl winning an Academy Award... and a 13-year-old girl already training to be the first person on Mars... So, this year, we want everyone at Roseville to realise that you can have a huge impact on the world."

Empowering girls for a bright, meaningful future is truly at work at Roseville College. In 2016, the College was officially

authorised as an IB Primary Year's Programme (PYP) school, offering the program to all girls in the Junior School from Kindergarten to Year 6. Head of Junior School, Mrs Tanya Vaughan, and her team including Year 6 teacher Mrs Henrietta Miller and the 2016 NSW ICT Educator of the Year. Junior School Executive for Innovation. Mrs Abi Woldhuis. chose and pursued the IB PYP for its promise to have a lasting, meaningful impression on each girl because of her experiences and education at Roseville College.

For senior girls, in Years 9 – 10 and in preparation for the rigorous HSC examinations, Roseville College is now one of only three Sydney schools – and the only on the North Shore - offering the globally recognised Cambridge qualifications in Physical Science and Global Perspectives. In an initiative driven by our Director of Learning, Ms Deborah Magill. who succeeded Mrs Megan Krimmer as Principal in 2017, the world-class, global Cambridge Courses give students an international outlook that is increasingly vital for young people at this stage of their education. It opens their eyes and broadens their perspectives, while also developing valuable skills that equip them for meaningful life-long learning.

At Roseville College, excellence and ambition in academic and co-curricular learning is one way that our School demonstrates its priority on honouring God in all we do. Pervasive to College life – including teaching and learning, chapel, pastoral care, our community events and a wide range of other activities offered to students - is the belief that each girl has priceless worth and value, and that being part of a reliable and unified school community has immeasurable importance in the lives of girls.

Rouse Hill Anglican College is a Kindergarten to Year 12 school located in the northwest growth corridor of the Sydney metropolitan area. The College aims to provide a quality and affordable Christian education that will prepare our students to be meaningful contributors to society. The College mission of 'Christain, Caring and Dynamic' is reflected in the day-to-day interactions and program. In 2016, our College has continued to provide a broad scope of service learning programs for all students from Kindergarten through to Year 12.

Our College continues to participate in overseas service programs. In 2016, a group of students and staff travelled to Hong Kong and Vietnam. In Hong Kong, the group participated in volunteer programs with Crossroads International before travelling to Vietnam where students assisted with housing construction and the development of a community garden.

Our students continue to be presented with the gospel message through our chapel program, which is supported by our Christian education classes. Our chapel and Christian fellowship groups are also well supported by youth ministry teams from our local Anglican churches as well as Crusaders.

The academic programs of the College are innovative and challenging, and student achievement in wider testing including NAPLAN and the Higher School Certificate, has been pleasing and has allowed students to enter a diverse range of tertiary programs. The College has a strong cocurricular program with a broad range of options for students to choose from in the areas of sport, performing arts, interest areas, leadership, debating and other non-sport competitions.

The College is well supported by an active Parents and Friends Association which seek to support the mission and activities of the College through their service, social and fundraising initiatives. In 2016, the P and F raised \$45,000

towards the purchase of musical instruments for our cocurricular music programs and improved shade structures.

Our 20-year Master Plan has been submitted to the NSW State Planning Department for review and approval and we look forward to the commencement of some of these projects within our site. One of the goals of the project is to bring our junior school together in one precinct within the College grounds, while still maintaining shared spaces for the whole College. The first stage of the Master Plan will be the construction of a Kindergarten and Pre-K building, to be located on the vacant land that was purchased in 2015. This will be an exciting development as we will introduce a new Pre-K grade to our Junior School. As we are still in the lengthy approval process, it is expected that this building will be constructed in 2018 for occupation and commencement of our Pre-K program in 2019.

In a world where we experience such rapid change, where new development, new inventions, new initiatives and ideas seem to drive our society, it is important to remember that through all of this, God's love for us is unchanging. The writer of the book of Hebrews tells us to:

"Keep your lives free from the love of money and be content with what you have, because God has said,

"Never will I leave you; never will I forsake you."

Jesus Christ is the same yesterday and today and forever." Hebrews 13: 5, 8

Change is good and sometimes necessary. But, though we may change, though circumstances may change, Jesus does not. He is always there for us, always dependable, always concerned for us. With Christ as our sure foundation, we will be able to move through times of change with the reassurance that His selfless love, mercy, grace, compassion and abundant promises, will remain steadfast.

At our 2016 Presentation evening I spoke on Wisdom, one of our four College values. I made these comments which are shortened for the sake of this report:

As we take the time to reflect on 2016 the challenges that occasionally consume our attention on any one day pale into insignificance when compared to the privilege of teaching, modelling and empowering that sort of wisdom.

Vibrant chapel programs, growing Cru groups and robust conversations in Christian Studies play as important a role as the QILT (Quality In Learning and Teaching) group's devotion to developing a whole school learning framework. the K-12 team who prepared our annual staff conference on differentiation and the work of TIWP (Technology Integration Working Party) in strengthening our use of our new online learning system.

At each turn, and in our case with each step up or down our very own hillside, it is impossible not to be struck by the commitment of so many to honouring God in the classroom, in the playground and beyond. There have been plenty of successes throughout 2016 and we have celebrated them, rightfully, throughout the year in crowded newsletters and assemblies. Students continue to engage positively in their learning and to take up the many opportunities that are provided by the cocurricular program.

St Luke's Grammar School is located on the Northern Beaches of Sydney. It operates on two campuses; Dee Why and Bayview. Dee Why is a Pre-K to Year 12 Campus, while Bayview is a Pre-K to Year 6 Campus. The School is co-educational and provides an inclusive environment for students to learn together. The School's Motto, 'Christ Our Light', is lived out through formal and informal opportunities for students and staff to explore the Christian faith.

Mid-way through 2016 St Luke's Grammar School expanded to incorporate Loquat Valley School. The new Campus is known as St Luke's Grammar School, Bayview Campus. The Anglican Schools Corporation approached the Council and Principal of St Luke's Grammar School to undertake the leadership and management of Loquat Valley School. Both the Council and Principal felt that it was appropriate to do so to ensure the future viability of the Bayview school. It has been a significant challenge to bring the schools together but the common foundational purpose has made it possible to begin to create a unified vision for the future. Both schools had always been committed to providing an excellent quality education within a Christian framework.

The Dee Why Campus has seen another year of growth and improvement. The Class of 2016 achieved outstanding Higher School Certificate results. However, it was not just their academic results which were celebrated, but the way in which the students were involved in the wider community serving those around them. There was a significant number of students who completed their Gold Duke of Edinburgh Award which reflected their commitment beyond the classroom.

This commitment beyond the classroom also saw students gaining early entry to Universities. The academic results continue to improve and the number of students electing to pursue university studies has steadily increased. The School continues to be placed as the highest non-selective school in the area.

The School expanded its curriculum offering to include Spanish and Mandarin and these have proven to be popular with the students. Students continue to engage positively in their learning and to take up the many opportunities that are provided by the co-curricular program. The Drama production for the year catered for the involvement of a large number of students and the Music programs encompass both classical and contemporary offerings. Work began on the John Scott Hall to refurbish it to make it more a useful performance space. The work has been ongoing from the end of Term 1, 2016 and is expected to be completed at the end of Term 1, 2017. To accommodate the large number of students who participate in the basketball program, a basketball training facility was developed in an adjacent building owned by the School.

Students continued to be engaged in a variety of community service programs. Year 9 continues to partner with Arranounbai School and Year 10 with an Aged Care facility. Students were also involved in social basketball for disabled students, service trips and the partnership with Anglicare in the annual Toys 'n' Tucker Appeal. Each Year Group undertakes a project which helps the students to look beyond themselves and to respond with compassion to others.

The reputation of the College as being a place where young people can re-build their confidence and their commitment to learning is growing rapidly...

Trades Norwest Anglican Senior College is a College in the north-west of Sydney that provides an alternative approach to senior studies so that students can gain their HSC while starting a school-based apprenticeship in a trade. The innovative senior studies program consists of a set pattern of study that focusses on subjects to support students moving into a trade-based career pathway. The subject selection involves no HSC examinations while still qualifying students for their HSC.

Once students gain an apprenticeship they work for their employer for 2 days per week on the days chosen by the employer, participate in trade training for one day per week and are in the classroom at College for the other 2 days per week. The classroom subjects are delivered through an integrated unit of work each term that students complete on the days they are at College.

The College experienced significant growth in 2016 with the introduction of Year 10. The College enrolments peaked at 86 students during the year.

The sudden growth meant that more staff were employed to work with the class groups and the calibre of staff applying was very high and included a high number of active Christian teachers. The new staff had to adapt quickly to a new style of teaching and to preparing programs for the Year 10 cohort along similar lines to the integrated self-paced project work of the Year 11 and 12 program. It has been observed that this approach has continued to provide good opportunities for students at the College to re-engage with learning and success in their studies.

More than 30 Year 12 students were in the cohort that graduated in 2016 and they achieved the highest average marks in their internal assessments in English and General Mathematics of any group to date. This result speaks highly of the success of this approach to learning for students who choose to transfer to Trades Norwest from mainstream academic schools.

In 2015 we began an exciting relationship with the Wunan Foundation, an Aboriginal development organisation in the East Kimberley, Western Australia. The Foundation has a

clear purpose and strategy to drive long-term socio-economic change for Aboriginal people by providing real opportunities, investing in people's abilities, and by encouraging and rewarding aspiration and self-responsibility. Wunan provide scholarships for selected students from the Halls Creek and Kununurra area of the East Kimberley to come to school in Sydney and to complete their secondary education. In 2016, one of their students completed his HSC studies at Trades Norwest while commencing trade training in Automotive and moving into a full-time Automotive apprenticeship in Sydney. He was supported financially by Anglican Aid, Danebank and Abstudy. Trades Norwest has been privileged to be involved in this exciting program that is helping to break the cycle of dependence of indigenous youth.

The RTO associated with the College provides training and accreditation in Business Services, Carpentry, Electrotechnology, White Card and First Aid. The majority of students in Years 11 and 12 are studying either Carpentry or Electrotechnology and continue at the College past the end of Year 12 to complete the Certificate III qualification in these trade areas. Students who are interested in other trades study those courses at local TAFE Colleges. The Motor Traders Association provides training in Automotive at the College for students in Years 11 and 12.

In fitting with the trades focus of the College the vision is 'Building the right foundation', and students are encouraged to consider the words of Isaiah, 'The Lord will be the sure foundation of your times, a rich store of salvation and wisdom and knowledge'. It is our hope that all students will be encouraged to seek faith in Christ as the foundation for their life.

The reputation of the College as being a place where young people can re-build their confidence and their commitment to learning is growing rapidly and the 'best kept secret of the north-west' is now much less hidden.

The College is moving from strength to strength as the word of our innovative approach to senior studies is becoming better known. The change that is happening in the lives of the young people who come to the College is the inspiration for us to push forward with the work of the College.
